Rubbish, Recycling and Cleaning

Fire safety

Please read these fire instructions carefully.


The property is fitted with heat and smoke alarms according to the current legislation. Please do not touch these sensors. If there is anything you are concerned about please contact the property manager.

The kitchen has a fire blanket, it is located on the left side of the worksurface, when facing the hob and oven.

There is a fire escape ladder on top of the kitchen cupboard on the left side of the window. This ladder can be fitted on the window sill and offers an escape route through the kitchen window in case of an emergency that prevents you using the front door.

There is a fire extinguisher in the hall that can be used as a fire shield. It can temporarily shield the fire to enable you to leave through the front door which is the main fire exit.

History Peebles town (from Wikipedia pages)

Initially, a <u>market town</u>, Peebles played a role in the woollen industry of the Borders during the 19th and early-20th centuries. Most mills closed by the 1960s, although the last one remained open until 2015. The character of Peebles has changed; the town serves as home to many people who commute to work in <u>Edinburgh</u>, as well as being a popular <u>tourist</u> destination, especially in the summer. In the mid-to-late 19th century <u>health tourism</u> flourished, centring on <u>hydropathic establishments</u>, which over time morphed into a hotel format, with Peebles Hydro Hotel being one of the few survivors of that era. Notable buildings in the town include the <u>Old Parish Church of Peebles</u> and <u>Neidpath Castle</u>. Other local attractions include a museum and the Kailzie Gardens. Peebles has won multiple awards for the range of shops on its High Street.

Location

Peebles lies at the confluence of the <u>River Tweed</u> and <u>Eddleston Water</u> (locally called "the Cuddy"). The Tweed flows west to east, and the Eddleston flows from the north, turning to flow southwest 300 yd (270 m) before the confluence. This south-westerly turn demarcates a raised triangular piece of land, open to the east but contained by the rivers to the south and north. The name is generally accepted to come from the <u>Brythonic</u> pebyll tents, signifying a temporary settlement. [9]

From around 1570, the eastern side was defended by a town wall, which ran in an east-facing arc, through which the road to <u>Glentress</u> passed at the East Gate. The road passing through this gate, the Eastgate, is one of four gates in Peebles, the others being Northgate, Bridgegate (where the Eddleston Water was crossed to the north of town), and Ludgate (the western gate of the town), now called Young Street. At the junction of Eastgate and Northgate roads, where the Eastgate becomes High Street, is an ancient market cross. The present-day market is held in a car park adjacent to the site of the former railway station, at the north and south ends of which are the remains of the town wall. Peebles High Street runs parallel with the Tweed along the spine of a ridge, at the west end of which is the parish church.

Historic features and traditions

The oldest building in Peebles is the tower of <u>St Andrew's</u> Church. The church was founded in 1195. It was destroyed (along with many other Borders <u>abbeys</u> and <u>priories</u>) by the soldiers of <u>Henry VIII</u>. The stones of the ruins were pilfered for many other local buildings leaving only the tower standing amongst the gravestones of the churchyard. Another ancient church in the town is the Cross Kirk, founded in 1261. Although now mainly ruins, the Cross Kirk plays a prominent part in the local festival.

The annual local festival in Peebles is called the <u>Beltane</u>, and involves (as with many Borders festivals) a <u>Common Riding</u>. The Beltane, proclaimed at the cross, culminates with the crowning of the Beltane Queen (a girl chosen from one of

three local <u>primary schools</u>) along with her court, including the likes of the First and Second Courtiers, Sword Bearer and Standard Bearer; on the steps in front of the parish church. The adult principal of the festival is the <u>Cornet</u>, a local young man chosen by the organizing committee on a basis of being considered worthy of representing the town, who then carries the town standard for a year.

To the west of the town is <u>Neidpath Castle</u>, which can be reached on foot through Hay Lodge Park; the route has views of the castle. The castle is now closed to the public. Entrance to the <u>Chambers Institution</u>

On the south side of the High Street are the old <u>burgh</u> offices. These incorporate the town's library, art gallery, and local museum. The building occupied by these is called the <u>Chambers Institution</u>, being deeded to the town by <u>William Chambers</u>, a member of the <u>Chambers</u> publishing family who originated in the town. Chambers' house can be found on the oldest street in Peebles – Biggiesknowe. Peebles tolbooth, the civic centre of the medieval burgh, is the only medieval tolbooth site in Scotland to have been excavated by archaeologists. Peebles is no longer connected to the railway network. In years past, the <u>Symington</u>, <u>Biggar and Broughton Railway</u> had lines that connected <u>Peebles to</u> <u>Edinburgh</u> and <u>Galashiels</u>, with a <u>goods station</u> and <u>Peebles</u> and Peebles West stations. A connection to Edinburgh is maintained by Borders Buses service X62.

Top trails (examples from <u>10 Best Trails, Walks, and Paths in Peebles | AllTrails</u>

#1 - Neidpath Castle and Viaduct Circular

Length: 4.7 km • Est. 1h 13m

Start at Haylodge Park






Starting at the Swimming Pool car park (fee required), the trail winds along the bank of the River Tweed, passing Hay Lodge Park, Fotheringham Bridge, The Dookits, and Neidpath Castle. The trail then crosses the river via Neidpath Viaduct, and returns to the start along the river bank and over Tweed Bridge with views over the water. After the viaduct you have the option of either winding along the river as mapped or passing through Neidpath Tunnel, rejoining the trail near Fortheringham bridge in Haylodge Park.___

Moderate • 4.5 #2 - Neidpath Castle and Lyne Station Circular Start at Hay Lodge Park

Length: 12.1 km • Est. 3h 15m



This walk starts along the river in Peebles and you will walk through forest paths past Neidpath Castle, past a Viaduct and along the Tweed on an old railway track. Continue along and cross the Tweed, walking through farmland next to the Tweed and past Barns Tower. You will walk through farmland then cross the old manor bridge, go up the hill to get a good view back over the Tweed. The return to Peebles is again through quiet forests. It is a beautiful river walk with lots of wildlife. __

#3 - Portmore Reservoir Circular

Length: 9.2 km • Est. 2h 33m



Enjoy this 9.2-km circular trail near Peebles, Scottish Borders. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 33 min to complete. This is a popular trail for hiking, running, and walking, but you can still enjoy some solitude during quieter times of day. The best times to visit this trail are October through October.

Moderate • 4.6

#4 - Pilots' Trail and Cademuir Hill

Length: 9.2 km • Est. 3h 5m

Beautiful views of Peebles and Glentress await you from atop Cademuir Hill, on this trail spanning nearly 6 miles of beautiful Scottish Borders forestry. This trail can be a little uneven and muddy underfoot, so supportive footwear is highly recommended. Dogs are very welcome but expect livestock in this area. Great amenities in Peebles, with lots of local businesses to grab a bite to eat. Enjoy the trail!


#5 - Soonhope Burn and Venlaw Loop

Length: 7.9 km • Est. 2h 30m

This walk will take you out of Peebles past some holiday cottages and into the woods. At the top of the mountain you will have great views of the town and across to Cademuir and beyond. This is a good intermediate walk with some elevation gain but a good to complete over a few hours. There are a variety of trails east of this one that include mountain biking trails as well.



Fishing in and around Peebles

Well known as "The Queen of the Scottish Salmon Rivers", the magnificent River Tweed runs through the heart of our Scottish Borders.

Although the River Tweed is most associated with internationally famous salmon and trout fishing, there is a wide choice of fishing available, such as perch, grayling, pike and roach fishing.

River fishing is Britain's biggest participation sport and The Scottish Borders has everything for the angler.

The Tweeds' 97 miles of fishing regularly produces in the region of 10,000 fish per annum to the rod angler.

There is a disabled fishing platform on the Tweed in Peebles about halfway between the Tweed bridge and Fotheringham Bridge en-route to Hay Lodge Park on the south side of the river.

In Peebles some accommodation can provide excellent private fishing. There are no public 'rights to fish' in inland waters, but all river waters are under private ownership or municipal control, so check for details of rod licenses, close seasons and other restrictions.

The Tweed boasts one of the longest season of any Salmon River in Great Britain. The season begins on the 1st of February and runs right through to the 30th of November, with fishing available from Monday through to Saturday (no Sunday fishing). However the Upper Tweed (Peebles region) is best in the Autumn, September to November.

Beats close to Peebles include Dawyck, Glenormiston, Traquair and Lower Caberston.

The season for other types of fishing is 1st April to 30th September.
